SPECIAL CHARGE CONFERENCE VIA ZOOM

Wednesday, December 17 at 7:00 p.m.

The Leadership Board has asked and received permission from our District Superintendent Rev. Dr. lanther Mills to convene a special Charge Conference on Wednesday, December 17 at 7 p.m. via ZOOM for the purpose of revising the clergy compensation agreement for 2026. This is an administrative issue to correct an oversight.

When the Board made its recommendations earlier in the fall, it was not aware that the UMC would be implementing new formulas in 2026 for the contributions made by churches to their pastor's pension plan. It was the intention of the Board to increase the pastor's total compensation (salary, housing allowance, pension contributions) by the same cost of living increase granted to social security recipients. However, after the new formulas for pension contributions were applied the total compensation fell far short of the objective. The purpose of this Charge Conference is to approve a correction of the clergy compensation report to achieve the Board's original intentions.

The Charge Conference is comprised of the Leadership Board and retired ordained ministers who hold membership at Faith. The Conference will take place via ZOOM. If you have questions, please contact Bill Maas (billmaas@verizon.net), chair of the leadership board.

December 14 - Isaiah 55:1-13

Incline your ear, and come to me; listen, so that you may live. I will make with you an everlasting covenant.

The prophet Isaiah implores us to seek the Lord in all things, and to remember that like the heavens, God's ways are higher than our ways and each divine word accomplishes God's purpose.

Consider:

- How are you "seeking the Lord?"
- In this passage, God expands his covenant, and Isaiah reminds us that God's words and God's ways are higher than ours. What, in your mind, is it important to consider when thinking about God's ways and purpose?
- On this third Sunday in Advent, we celebrate joy. The prophet tells us, "For you shall go out in joy and return in peace; the mountains and hills before you shall burst into song and all the trees of the field shall clap their hands." How will you choose abundant, extravagant joy this week?

On a sacred journey (John 4:13-14)

Jesus said to the Samaritan woman, "Everyone who drinks of this water will be thirsty again, but those who drink of the water that I will give them will never be thirsty. The water that I will give will become in them a spring of water gushing up to eternal life."

Jesus' choice of a Samaritan and a woman to converse with was a surprising one for many people. She goes on to be a witness and evangelist. What things do you turn to for comfort and gratification? How do they differ from the idea of the "living water" that Jesus offers? How might you be a witness to the joy and abundance of God this week?
