And we're off...

Beloved,

As we enter the sacred season of Advent a little early, we step into a story that is older than time yet ever new—a story of longing, hope, and holy expectation. Advent is not merely a countdown to Christmas; it is a pilgrimage, a prophetic journey that calls us to move with intention toward the glory of God revealed in Christ. This year, our theme is "Unto Glory: A Prophetic Pilgrimage." It invites us to see ourselves as travelers on a sacred road, guided by the promises of God and the light of Christ that shines in the darkness.



Pilgrimage is not a straight line; it is a series of movements—seven, to be exact—that shape our hearts and transform our lives. These movements are not just steps on a map; they are spiritual postures that prepare us to encounter Emmanuel, God-with-us. Let us walk through them together.

Awakening and Anticipation

Pilgrimage begins with awakening—a stirring in the soul that whispers, "There is more." Advent awakens us to the reality that God is near, even when the world feels fractured and weary. We might feel called to lift our eyes from the ordinary and notice something emerging in the distance. We might dream of what is to come. We prepare for the journey. In these moments, we might hear the prophetic voice crying: The people who walk in darkness have seen a great light! What might be revealed in that light?

Setting Off

To journey toward glory, we leave behind what has been. Pilgrimage requires release, the release of fear, of control, of the false securities that tether us to the familiar. Leaving can include loss. It can also be a source of liberation. Advent invites us to loosen our grip and trust the One who leads us. Off we go...



Reflection

Intentional reflection allows us to see where we have been and what God reveals along the way. Advent invites us to slow down and notice the grace that meets us in unexpected places—light breaking into darkness, peace rising amid chaos, Christ present in the ordinary. Reflection calls for humility; it opens our hearts to receive what cannot be earned but must be noticed to change us. In quiet moments, we ask: What have we discovered?

Responding

Pilgrimage is not only about what we receive but how we live because of it. On this Advent journey, we are called to move from passive waiting to active witness. Like the shepherds who ran to Bethlehem and the Magi who offered their treasures, we respond with worship, generosity, and justice. We respond with compassion and love. Our lives become a testimony that the Word has become flesh and dwells among us.

Sharing

Every pilgrimage ends where it began—but we are never the same. Our return from pilgrimage likely leads us back to our ordinary lives, somehow transformed. Our lives become a testimony that the Word has become flesh and dwells among us. We return carrying the light of Christ back into a world that still longs for hope. The journey does not end at Christmas; it begins anew in every act of sharing love, sharing peace, sharing the work of justice.

Beloved, this Advent, let us walk these seven movements together. Let's anticipate how we will be changed by the journey, support one another along the way and allow ourselves to become new, transformed by Christ with us again.

Hub Advent Study

This year, we have been organized into "hubs," with other United Methodist congregations in our area. Our hub partners include North Bethesda, Rockville, Jerusalem Mount Pleasant and Millian Memorial United Methodist Churches. Each week, a different pastor from the hub will lead our conversation. You'll meet members from other congregations, share time in worship and study, and ground yourself in hope for this season.

From the Director of Music

Happy Thanksgiving, Happy Advent, Merry Christmas, and Happy New Year! It's the most wonderful time of the year, when what we celebrate is togetherness, family and friends, preparing for Christ's coming, Christ's birth, and the renewal and hope that can come with a new year.

Chancel Choir and Chamber Orchestra Present Bach Cantata 142 during 10 a.m. Worship Sunday, December 14

We are delighted to present Bach Cantata BWV 142, "For Us a Child is Born," sung in English with PowerPoint slides shown on our big screen, as part of our Advent worship at Faith United Methodist Church. While long attributed to Johann Sebastian Bach, recent musicological research suggests that Bach may not have been the composer. The work is now believed to be by an unknown composer, possibly Johann Kuhnau, 1660-1722, Bach's predecessor as Cantor in Leipzig.

Regardless of its authorship, the cantata provides a wonderful glimpse into the role of music in the Lutheran church during the time Bach and Kuhnau worked. Cantatas were an integral part of the Sunday morning liturgy, typically performed after the Gospel reading and before the sermon. These multi-movement works were not just concerts; they were sacred musical commentaries that reinforced the day's Biblical lessons, guiding the congregation in meditation and prayer.

"For Us a Child is Born" is scored for choir, soloists (alto, tenor, and bass), and a colorful instrumental ensemble that includes two alto recorders, two oboes, strings (violins and viola), and continuo. It opens with an instrumental Sinfonia, setting a tone of festive anticipation. The structure then unfolds through various movements: a double fugue chorus on the main text, expressive arias for tenor, baritone, and alto soloists, and an alto recitative. The work culminates in an energetic and glorious "Alleluia" chorus, providing a triumphant close that echoes the joyful news of Christ's birth.

Young Singers of Faith Family Service Christmas Eve

We are still running a Young Singers of Faith ensemble for children in elementary school interested in learning to use their voices and contributing on occasion to 10 a.m. Sunday worship in the Sanctuary. We rehearse after the 10 a.m. worship service in the Sanctuary (often after children have had a chance to nosh at the Fellowship time in Fellowship Hall). Our next opportunity to contribute to worship is for the Family Service Christmas Eve. It's time for Quarters for Kids: Advent 2025

For the past nine years, Faith's children and youth have led the congregation in collecting quarters during the Advent season. Over 28,000 quarters have gone to the UMC-affiliated Board of Child Care to buy "their kids" clothes, food, presents, and celebrations for significant life moments and The Heifer Project to help provide families with flocks of young chickens and ducks for eggs, hives of honeybees that can double the yield of fruits and vegetables, goats for milk, and sheep for wool to make warm clothing. This year Faith will be collecting quarters for The Heifer Project again.



Paper folders for quarter collection will be distributed to the Faith children and youth the first Sunday of Advent (November 30th); the congregation will also get their "special" collection pouches at that time too. Kids may turn in their collection on Christmas Eve or any Sunday through January 4th during the Children's Moment; Adults may place their quarters in the offering chest in the Narthex. Electronic giving may be done through the Faith website; click on "Give" and follow the prompts.

Let's make this year's campaign the largest yet and give disadvantaged families the best possible gift – a sustainable food source throughout the year and warm clothing to wear. Our "pocket change" can make this happen. Be a superhero and start saving your quarters now!

Giving is slightly down this quarter. If you're behind on your pledge, now is a great time to catch up.

Rental income fell due to tenants reducing their space needs.

Other income increased due to designated donations for the bell refurbishment, the summer work trip, and a \$14,000 security grant. These restricted funds make the total income appear higher than usual. The corresponding expenses for these items are reflected in the non-budgeted expenses line below.

Salaries are under budget due to the building manager position starting in Q3 instead of Q2.

Evangelism is under budget because budgeted communications costs did not begin until late Q2.

Building expenses are over budget due to unbudgeted repairs.

Scheduled monthly donations are up to date.

This year's deficit budget reflects a commitment by leadership to invest in the church's growth and outreach. Priorities include youth programming, evangelism, and the addition of a part-time Building Manager. These investments are designed to strengthen our ministry and position us for long-term impact, even as they require a short-term financial commitment beyond our current income.



THIRD Quarter Outreach Giving

Through the tithes and offerings committed to our operating budget, Faith supported the following organizations this quarter.

Giant Gift Card Program

Our Giant Gift Card Program is an easy way to support the church while doing your everyday shopping. When you purchase Giant gift cards at face value, the church buys the cards at a discounted rate, allowing us to keep the difference as fundraising income. You receive the full value of the card to use on groceries you would buy anyway, and the church benefits at no additional cost to you. To take advantage of the program, email Kim Webster at kwebster@faithworkshere.com and let her know the total amount you'd like to spend and the card denominations (for example: \$150 total as one \$100 card and one \$50 card). We will purchase the cards for you and let you know when they arrive—or, if we already have them on hand, we can provide them to you immediately. Once you receive your cards, simply submit a check for the total amount and write "Giant cards" in the memo line.

Capital Improvement Upgrades

Faith was approved to receive \$95,500 from the State of MD "Protecting Against Hate Crime" Grant Program to fund security upgrades. These upgrades will include the installation of a new Sanctuary door with access control and accessibility features, access control for other exterior doors, and a new alarm system.

Accessibility Upgrades Underway

The Leadership Board approved funding requested by the Accessibility and Inclusion Team to complete several accessibility upgrades around the building. The completed work included replacing the ramp leading up to the Sanctuary entrance and the installation of ADA compliant warning pads at the Sanctuary entrance and three other locations around the building.

Quarterly Giving Statements

Quarterly giving statements were emailed in October. If you made contributions but didn't receive one please contact Kim Webster, Finance Manager. Other Ways to Give

If you're age 70½ or older, you can make a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD)—a direct gift from your IRA to FUMC. QCDs count toward your Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) but are excluded from taxable income, offering a valuable tax benefit (especially for those who take the standard deduction). Many in our congregation give this way—it's a simple, tax-smart method to support the church.

Note: The RMD age is now 73, but QCDs are still allowed starting at age 70½. Ask your tax advisor if this option is right for you.

Benefits of Donating Stock

DEADLINE DECEMBER 1, 2025.

If you've owned stock for more than a year and it has increased in value, donating it directly to the church can be a tax-smart way to give—if you itemize deductions. You can deduct the fair market value of the stock and avoid paying capital gains tax on the appreciation. If the stock is held for less than a year, your deduction is limited to what you originally paid for it. By donating appreciated stock instead of selling it first, your gift can go up to 20% further—thanks to the tax savings. Always consult your tax advisor to see if this option is right for you. The United Methodist Church Ratifies Four Constitutional Amendments

The 2024 General Conference of The United Methodist Church approved by a two-thirds majority four Constitutional Amendments:

- 1. Worldwide Regionalization this amendment would organize The United Methodist Church into geographic bodies for governance.
- 2. Inclusion in Membership This amendment would add "Gender" and "Ability" to the list of characteristics that do not bar people from membership in a United Methodist congregation.
- 3. Racial Justice This amendment strengthens the denomination's longtime support for racial justice.
- 4. Educational Requirements for Voting Rights This amendment clarifies the educational requirements for clergy delegates to General Conference and Jurisdictional Conferences.

Once approved by the General Conference, amendments must be ratified by all members of The United Methodist Church via their local church Lay Member to Annual Conference and all church Elders. Faith's Lay Member and Pastor voted on amendment ratification at the Baltimore-Washington Annual Conference in May 2025. Since this is a worldwide vote, each Annual Conference reported their results only to the Council of Bishops for consolidation.

The Council of Bishops has completed their vote count with approximately 37,000 Lay Members and Clergy voting. On November 5, 2025, the Council announced that all amendments were overwhelmingly ratified by a 92% Yea to 8% Nay vote. The constitution will now be updated with the specific language of each amendment. ACCESSIBILITY AND INCLUSION

As we welcome church members and visitors to our services and building over the Advent Season, the Accessibility and Inclusion Ministry (AIM) would like to help you with making our family members and others with disabilities comfortable attending our services. You may have noticed that we have improved the accessibility of our exterior entrances to the church with improved ramps and tactile pads.

We have a bookshelf in the Sanctuary entrance that holds different accommodations people might need: large print hymnals and Bibles, magnifying glasses, headphones to block out noise for those who might be sensitive, and FM wireless receivers that work with Faith's sound system to magnify the voices through the microphones.

We also have an elevator and accessible bathrooms, as well as seating options located in the back of the Sanctuary and a pew cut on the pulpit side of the Sanctuary for those who use a wheel chair, walker, or have other mobility needs.

Finally, as we open our church to all who want to come and worship with us, following these tips for interacting with individuals with disabilities will help to affirm our respect for the dignity of every one of God's children.
